ecent cultural policy developments in East European have taken place within the shift into a digital and globalised political economy and culture. In the second half of the twentieth century, this process of policy development can be analyzed through the lens of modernity and a process of modernization which, rather than being disrupted by authoritarian state socialist regimes was, in contrast, intensively pursued (Rindzevičiūtė, 2021). This has led the countries of the former Yugoslavia, including Montenegro, to follow Western policy processes and to adopt similar instruments and systems in their own policy frameworks (REF). Alongside the policy transfer process as a direct application of instruments and tools, many Balkan countries have also experienced multi-decade long processes of "soft" or "indirect" policy transfer through the active processes of Europeanisation exercised mainly via the EU pre-accession (IPA) instruments (2006).

These processes of cultural development have taken place alongside various international programs to create new and diverse forms of cultural diplomacy, cultural exchange and models of international cultural cooperation. Yet the ways in which these cultural policies function across institutional, political and social paradigms has received little attention. As Outhwaite and Ray (2005) discuss in their work on social theory, whilst it may be the case that 'we are all postcommunist now', this is not the ideological demobilization of what Habermas called 'the exhaustion of utopian energies', but rather the sense that the EU – and Europe more broadly – have been radically and irrevocably transformed by what the processes of European integration and development. This conference provides an opportunity to critically reflect on these themes and processes of policy development and transfer and to find optimal frameworks for strengthening and directing future cultural policy.

By highlighting the developmental issues of the Balkan regions and engaging in dialogue with cultural policy discourse in Western Europe and further afield, the conference aims to introduce a broader form of joint reassessment of the principles underpinning the current European cultural policy environment. To bring academics, funders, policymakers, artists and managers into a broader dialogue, the conference is designed as a multi-disciplinary platform and includes a number of sessions addressing topics of concern to the sector. This includes a specific focus on the tension between organizational culture (within the bounds of the institution) and the broader civic ambitions necessary for any future articulation of cultural policy.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Creative Hub, former prison in the Old Town: The Museum of the Prison in Kotor, also known as the "Old Prison" and "Austro-Hungarian Prison," is located within a well-preserved prison complex dating back to the mid-19th century, built during the Austro-Hungarian rule in the region, designed by the Dalmatian architect Marko Bencon. The three-story building, painted in the characteristic yellow colour by which Austrian prisons were recognized, is made of stone and brick composing thick walls, with windows protected by wrought iron grilles. On the facade, there is a plaque erected in honor of sailors who led a rebellion against the Austro-Hungarian fleet in 1918. During World War II, it served as a collection center for Italian occupiers who sent captured civilians from here to camps in Bar, Croatia, Hungary, Albania, and Italy. The prison ceased operations in the early 1990s, after 150 years. By the initiative of the Ministry of Culture of Montenegro, with the support of regional ministries of culture, the prison

was repurposed into a museum and a creative and artistic center with possibilities for artist residencies. Through careful conservation and innovative solutions, the restoration was completed, and the old prison building in Kotor was repurposed, creating a safe and inspiring interior adapted for artist residencies and exhibitions intended for visitors.



Kotor Old Town is one of Montenegro's most photogenic, fascinating, and popular attractions. Every year visitors from all around the globe come to see this UNESCO World Heritage site on the shore of the Bay of Kotor, , Montenegro. Kotor's cobbled streets and narrow alleyways offer a glimpse into its 2,000-year history. The cafes full of locals enjoying coffee in the sun and lively atmosphere give you an insight into Kotor's modern culture. The old town – that is the most famous part of Kotor, where the Kotor history, culture, and tradition are being preserved. The old town of Kotor has a great number of monuments of the medieval architecture: churches, cathedrals, palaces, and museums. Its beauty is complemented with the multitude of narrow streets, squares, and markets. The old

town of Kotor stands out also by the great number of stylishly made gates, palaces of the wealthy families, and a great number of stairs. The old nucleus of Kotor today is considered to be the best preserved medieval urban entity in the Mediterranean. The largest and the most impressive are, by all means, city bulwarks which surround the town.
